Jesus, the great surprise disruptor.

I reckon that Christmas is more about what we don't expect, than what we do. Across Sydney today, people everywhere are expecting presents. They are expecting food. Most are expecting family and or friends to visit. Few are expecting that Christmas will change anything in their lives. Isn't that a bit sad! Sure, it's comfortable, but I think we still get the celebration wrong.

In the time when Christ was born, that event we celebrate today began a quiet revolution, which gradually spread across the world in time and space.

It happened without much fanfare. It happened without pomp and ceremony. It happened.... In a backwater, on the edge of the Roman Empire, and it happened to a couple of kids, who couldn't even "get a room".

The birth of a baby, as humble as it is, changes everything. Life is now different. Different in so many ways.

I loved the little video we watched a few minutes ago because it points out in a simple way, how God works. And in doing so, it shows us that he rarely does what we think he should do.

But there is one thing we can be sure of, and that is that God's way is the best way.

If Jesus had come as a conquering King, he would have caused an upheaval to the politics of the day. But he didn't come to do that. He came to influence the lives of ordinary folk. An unmarried mother and her betrothed. Some local shepherds. A few visiting dignitaries we refer to as the "wise men".

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus in the manger, is it just a momentary celebration, a "nice moment" so we can get together during the holiday which is Christmas?

Or is it a change that keeps on giving. Change begets change. A renewed focus on others will do that.

I'm not sure what you expected from today's message, but I suspect it wasn't these words. I would have thought it may have been the traditional singing of "Away in a manger" and the platitudes that invokes.

But I really want to challenge you today. I invite you to reflect on how Christmas has changed you, and how it will, once again this year, change you again.

If you can identify a change or two brought about in you by the coming of Jesus to earth, I suggest you have plenty to celebrate today.
