Gail's Message

One of my favourite subjects during my time spent studying at the United Theological College was Homiletics, and the required text book *The Practice of Preaching* remains one I still use regularly; others sit collecting dust, just in case they may be useful, and the really boring, stuffy ones became library donations.

One of the reasons I so enjoyed both the Homiletics class and the text is because it managed to boil down all the theories and methods of preaching down to one manageable statement, "the purpose of preaching is to declare the Gospel of Jesus Christ".

Preaching is a big deal in our tradition, which is why we all sit with eyes towards the pulpit; pity the poor preacher who must overcome one of our most common and greatest fears, public speaking! Other traditions focus their attention on the altar and the elements of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, while the more evangelistic mega churches focus on experience, with live bands, fancy lighting and lots of visual stimulation.

Regardless of our style of worship, the sermon or message or reflection (it's basically the same thing) needs to express the Gospel, as relevant Good News; as relevant to us in the twenty first century as it was in the first. During Homiletics class one day a very open and honest student, a person who felt without any doubt God's call on her life to lead God's people said, "I don't think I know what the Gospel is". I was both touched by her willingness to be so vulnerable and also concerned.

If someone asked me to explain the gospel of the good news about Jesus Christ could I do so without umming and aahing? Was I able to define the very heart of my faith and belief? Did my courageous colleague's lack of clarity about the Gospel point to a lack of clarity in our worship and preaching?

I continue to think over these questions even to this day and I invite you all to join me. If a non-churched person asks us to explain the Gospel of the Good News about Jesus Christ what would you say?
