We have been offered the chance to join with the Hands and Feet group,

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Gail's Message

Wednesday 8th March was International Women's Day. Although I didn't celebrate the day in any particular fashion it did occur to me that I, as a woman, work in one of the most traditionally male vocations the world has ever known. Why? Here is a very, very brief history of the church that may offer some insights into the sexism that exists within the religious structures and institutions of Christianity.

In the first few hundred years after the spread of the gospels small churches sprung up across the Roman Empire. They were often persecuted for being weird, different and counter cultural. They were misunderstood, held in suspicion and eventually declared illegal by the ruling authorities. We get glimpses of these early churches in the New Testament. In Acts 2 we read that the early believers gathered together, holding all things in common so that anyone in need could receive assistance. We also know that early churches gathered in the homes of wealthy patrons, among whom were prominent women. In Paul's letters we read about "women who were the leaders of such house churches, Apphia in Philemon 2; Prisca in I Corinthians 16:19. This practice is confirmed by other texts that also mention women who headed churches in their homes, such as Lydia of Thyatira (Acts 16:15) and Nympha of Laodicea (Colossians 4:15). Women held offices and played significant roles in group worship. Paul, for example, greets a deacon named Phoebe (Romans 16:1) and assumes that women are praying and prophesying during worship (I Corinthians 11)."

If you know your scriptures well you may wonder about some of the passages that seem to condemn female leadership; more on the apparent contradictions within the scriptures another day folks! Back to church history. In the year 311 Constantine, the son of one of Rome's four rulers, won a battle that gave him ultimate power and authority over the Roman Empire. Constantine contributed his success to a vision of Christ and his subsequent sudden conversion. He then decreed that Christianity was no longer illegal (yeah!) and became the biggest financial supporter of the church, calling together bishops from across the empire and exerting influence over their decisions (boo!). Within a century Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire and from that time on, our faith lost its distinctiveness, particularly in regards to the place and status of women.

This week in worship we will hear John 4: 5-42, in which Jesus crosses all sorts of cultural barriers to speak to an unaccompanied Samaritan woman in the middle of the day. In this narrative we see perhaps the very first evangelist, teacher and leader and what do you know, she is a woman! The Way of Jesus, despite centuries of dilution under the cosiness of church and state still challenges us today to break down barriers, sexism, racism, age-ism, all the excluding 'isms' so that in Christ all are equal. Amen. "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." Galatians 3:28 - NIV
