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Gail's Message

This week in worship we will take a break from delving into the Old Testament and have a look at the book of Luke instead. Luke's Gospel has a particular emphasis on Jesus' ministry to the excluded and the disadvantaged and during the service we will look at three examples out of more than a dozen narratives that focus on the way Jesus related to people from all walks of life.

In one of my favourite text books theologian Mark Allan Powell describes Luke's Gospel as "probably being the most beautiful". Powell goes on to explain that Luke carefully traces Jesus' genealogy all the way back to Adam in order to emphasise,

"his connection to all humanity. Jesus challenges parochial attitudes that would limit God's care or blessings to any particular group or nation. Within this paradigm, those who might be despised or simply overlooked receive special attention. This concern for the excluded may also explain the prominence of women in Luke's Gospel and Luke seems to go out of his way to demonstrate that Jesus words and deeds apply to men and women alike. Luke's prevailing concern, however, is for the 'poor'. Jesus says in his first sermon that his ministry is 'to bring good news to the poor' and 'let the oppressed go free'. Lukes' concern for the poor is also accompanied by hostility towards those who are rich (see Blessings and Woes in Luke 6:20-26). In his Lukan parables, Jesus depicts the rich as fools who think that the essence of life is to be found in material possessions, or, worse, as persons destined to suffer eternal

Luke certainly does not spare our feelings as comfortable, well off Westerners, yet these harsh texts are reminders that we are called to partner with God, focusing on the people that suffer inequity. God's coming kingdom opposes and will vanquish greed, materialism, and selfishness and in the end the poor will be supremely blessed. May we too be a blessing to those who face exclusion and disadvantage. **Amen.**
