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THE GREAT REBUKE

Matthew 16: 21-28

Although the disciples had grasped the fact that Jesus was God's Messiah, the Son of God, they still had not grasped what that actually meant. Their idea of the Messiah was understood in terms of a conquering King, coming to sweep the Romans from Palestine and lead Israel to power. Before they could preach that Jesus was the Messiah, they had to learn what it meant.

So Jesus began to seek to open their eyes to the fact that for him, there was no way, but the way of the Cross. He said that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer at the hands of the "Elders and Chief priests and scribes." In effect, Jesus was saying that he must suffer at the hands of the religious leaders of the country. Not at all what Peter had envisaged!

What Peter thought he knew was not what Jesus knew. Jesus had "the big picture" in mind. Peter had something in mind, that to him, made perfect sense. He thought that Jesus had positioned himself to take over the country and free the Jews to rule themselves.

But Jesus had the long game in mind. He knew that Peter's way would not save mankind but would make a few people happy. Jesus knew that God's way would deal with salvation for all people for all time. Peter had a warped and short-term understanding and focus.

Jesus knew that his way was God's way. It meant suffering and pain, but, thank God, he was willing to take it, even against the best advice of his friends and followers. His way was the way of forgiveness and absolute love.

Even in your current short-term suffering, whatever that may be for you today, be assured that God's love for you is never ending. He suffered for you. He knows what suffering is, and overcame it, once and for all, for you and everyone who believes in him.

Let God embrace you, not rebuke you, as you continue to seek and do his will. - Adrian
