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Gail's Message

This week in worship we will ponder what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. In Mark 8:31-38, we hear Jesus say that "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me". This is a challenging reading, and it opens up to us a whole lot of questions about discipleship, including 'what is it' and 'what does it look like?'

These are big questions and together over the next few weeks we will begin to unpack what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. This morning as we share in worship and a delicious breakfast we will begin our exploration of discipleship by focusing on one of its vital aspects, care and compassion for one another.

In the poem below, Joy Cowley describes pastoral care as a bridge. Just as Jesus bridges the gap between our broken, self-centred, egoic, human natures and God's perfect, all loving, giving self, we too can all be bridges and in humility look to others to be a bridge for us.

The Bridge

There are times in life when we are called to be bridges, not a great monument spanning a distance and carrying great loads of heavy traffic, but a simple bridge to help one person from here to there over some difficulty such as pain, fear, grief, loneliness, a bridge which opens the way for on-going journey. When I become a bridge for another, I bring upon myself a blessing for I escape from the small prison of self and exist for a wider world, breaking out to be a larger being who can enter another's pain and rejoice in another's triumph. I know of only one greater blessing in this life, and that is, to allow someone else to be a bridge for me. Joy Cowley
