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Gail's Message

After worship today we will gather for our Congregational Annual General Meeting. Have you been looking forward to this day, eager with anticipation, or do you hear the words 'meeting after worship' and sigh, wondering how long it will be before you can get home and unwind? I am guessing most of us approach these meetings a mix bag of sentiments and we may wonder if we really need to be present.

Congregations by definition according to the Uniting Church's understanding, are the "embodiment in one place of the One Holy *Catholic* (this just means 'universal' in this context, not Roman Catholic as in the denomination) and Apostolic Church, worshipping, witnessing and serving as a fellowship of the Spirit in Christ. Its members meet regularly to hear God's Word, to celebrate the sacraments, to build one another up in love, to share in the wider responsibilities of the Church, and to serve the world." In the Uniting Church we also recognise that all members are gifted and that "every member of the Church is engaged to confess the faith of Christ crucified and to be his faithful servant. It acknowledges with thanksgiving that the one Spirit has endowed the members of Christ's Church with a diversity of gifts, and that there is no gift without its corresponding service: all ministries have a part in the ministry of Christ." This means we are all minsters, in that we are called to serve, (minister by definition means servant, or to serve).

I believe we are living in a very exciting yet challenging moment in church history. What has gone before is dying and what is yet to be born is still unclear. If you have ever been pregnant you will know how this in between time feels, its full of uncertainties and odd changes to the body. So too the church may feel uncomfortable and unsure about how to continue being the Body of Christ in the 21st Century. At this moment in time, what do we as the people of Greystanes Uniting Church want to become, what could we give birth too? Can we grow and expand? Will God be gracious to us? Can we be like Abraham's wife Sarah, who joyfully proclaims, "God has brought me laughter, and everyone who hears about this will laugh with me" and "who would have said to Abraham that Sarah would nurse children? Yet I have borne him a son in his old age." Genesis 21:7-8.
