Because we live in a modern, western orientated society, and by this I mean our systems of commerce, government and lifestyle we get away with thinking of ourselves as an individual. We think in terms of 'my career', 'my home', 'my car', 'my hobbies' and so on with little thought for how our actions and our very being impacts and effects the whole of society.

Individualistic societies display the following characteristics, autonomy, independence, self-sufficiency, uniqueness, personal achievement, individual liberties and rights and self-direction. These are not bad qualities, per se, however they are quite different to the qualities of humility, obedience and self-surrender required to truly serve God in Christ.

These traits are so ingrained within us that we rarely think of ourselves as being one body, one family, one people, or one tribe, despite the fact that this a biblical principle. God's chosen people, the people of Israel, did not see themselves as a group of individual souls but as a collective.

A collective society focuses on the group and cooperation, and it is founded on a very Christlike principle; sacrificing one's own comfort for the greater good of everyone else. The church founded upon Jesus Christ is also considered to be one body, however have you ever noticed how many of our contemporary hymns describe 'my Jesus', 'my rock', 'my salvation'?

Below is a recent Facebook post that nicely demonstrates the concept of being in communion with another, being one body committed to the welfare and well-being of each other.
