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Jesus the King versus Caesar Augustus

One was born in humble surroundings, the other born in a luxurious palace.

This Sunday we will celebrate and worship Jesus as the world's supreme and true King. At the time of Jesus' humble birth however another king ruled the world, the Roman Emperor Caesar Augustus. Caesar was the grand-nephew and adopted son of Julius Caesar, who after his assassination became deified. Julius was declared divine, partly due to the sentiment of the people but also because a comet had been seen shooting across the sky at the time of his death.

Both were known as peace bringers and the son of god.

Due to Julius being declared divine, Caesar Augustus became known across the world as the son of god. All the people of the empire had to bow down to him and surrender to his will because resistance was met with violence and bloodshed. In contrast, Jesus asks us to follow him, we are invited nor forced or coerced to surrender our will to his. Jesus does not demand our submission by threatening us with violence rather he wins our devotion through God's Spirit of love and truth.

One conquered the world through nonviolence, liberation and compassion, the other through armies, weapons and domination. Both shed blood, one upon the cross in self-surrender to save the world, the other through warfare to possess the world.

Caesar Augustus brought a false state of peace, the pax romana to the world through domination and violence. A human, mortal leader like Caesar Augustus can only play the short game, essentially saying, "what can I do to change the world within my lifetime, to bring glory and honour to my name?" Jesus as God's only true son plays the long game. Jesus willingly died an inglorious death to bring honour to God's holy name so that in the end all things will be reconciled.

One is still known and worshipped throughout the world, the other is now commonly referred to as a type of salad dressing.
